# **US Citizenship Process and Test Information**



## What is the Process for achieving US Citizenship?

### **Eligibility Criteria:**

To apply for U.S. citizenship, all of the following must apply

- 1. You have lived in the United States as a lawful permanent resident for at least five years (with exceptions for refugees, people who get their green card through political asylum, spouses of U.S. citizens, and U.S. military personnel)
- 2. You have been physically present in the United States for at least half of the last five years
- 3. You have lived in the district or state where you are filing your application for at least three months
- 4. You have not spent more than a year outside the United States
- 5. You have not made your primary home in another country
- 6. You are at least 18 years old
- 7. You have good moral character
- 8. You are able to speak, read, and write in English
- 9. You are able to pass a test covering U.S. history and government, and
- 10. You are willing to swear that you believe in the principles of the U.S. Constitution and will be loyal to the United States.

#### Process:

- 1. Complete a US Citizenship application.
- 2. Get two passport photos taken of yourself.
- 3. Gather all necessary documents (see <u>USCIS site</u>).

4. Send it with a copy of your green card, required photos, and the appropriate fee to the address listed in the site below. That site also includes information on fees.

- 5. Receive an appointment letter.
- 6. Go to the Finger Printing location provided in the appointment letter to have your fingerprints taken.
- 7. Wait for an interview to be scheduled.
- 8. Citizenship and Naturalization Interview
  - a. Go to the office location on the date and time specified
  - b. Bring identification and any additional documents requested
  - c. Answer questions about your application and background
  - d. Pass test on English and US history and government (in writing? Oral test?
  - e. Receive a decision

#### Taking the Oath:

- 1. Receive a ceremony date from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (formerly known as the INS).
- 2. Check in at the ceremony.
- Return your permanent resident card.
- 4. Answer questions about what you have done since your interview.
- 5. Take the naturalization oath.
- 6. Receive your Certificate of Naturalization.

This entire process can take anywhere from 5 months to more than 5 years.

# What is the US Citizenship Test?

This is a required step in the naturalization process, and all applicants, with some exceptions, must pass the citizenship test before taking the Oath of Allegiance and officially becoming United States citizens.

#### **English Test**

An officer of USCIS will ask you to:

 Respond to questions about your application and your background in English. These questions will be taken from the N400 application form.

- Read up to three sentences in English; the applicant must read 1 out of the 3 sentences correctly. The content focuses on civics and history topics.

- Write up to 3 dictated sentences in English. The applicant must write at least one of the sentences
  correctly. The content focuses on civics and history. A list of the vocabulary for all of the possible
  sentences can be found at the same link above.

#### Civics Test

- Applicants will be asked 10 questions from a list of 100 possible questions. The applicant must get 6/10 responses correct.
