
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How to Write a Thesis Statement



What is a thesis statement?

- ✓ A thesis statement is a sentence **that tells the reader what their essay** will be about.
- ✓ For a 5-paragraph essay, the thesis statement will **typically list three** items about the topic of the essay, one to be discussed in each of the 3 body paragraphs of the essay.
- ✓ For a 4-paragraph essay, the thesis statement will **typically list two** items about the topic of the essay,
- ✓ For a 3-paragraph essay, the thesis statement will list 1 main item to about the topic of the essay.

Why do I need a thesis statement?

✓ An essay needs a thesis statement because it provides the reader with a clue of what the essay will be about, which will help the reader better understand the main points before reading the essay.

Where does a thesis statement go?

 \checkmark The thesis statement should be **the last sentence in the introduction** paragraph.

How do I write a thesis statement?

- ✓ To write a strong thesis statement, you'll want to include a summary of all of the important information your essay will talk about.
- Ensure it includes the topic of your essay and the three items that each body paragraph will talk about.
